
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Second Grade News







Dear Parents,

I hope everyone is doing well and staying warm and healthy during this cold-spell we've been experiencing. The month of January is just flying by! In the beginning of February I will be enriching our daily activities to include Groundhog Day, super bowl, and Olympic themed activities that relate to our core concepts! Today you should have received your child's report card for the 2nd quarter. Inside the envelope was also the winter benchmarking scores for reading and math. Please remember these assessments are given 3 times a year and are a snapshot of your child's growth. Many other factors are taken into consideration when measuring their overall growth. Here is what we have been learning...

Reading: The past two weeks we have been reviewing previously learned comprehension strategies such as Comparing and Contrasting two stories and Questioning. I have been connecting our animal unit with reading in the book choices we read and listened to as a whole class. In the coming weeks, we will review authors purpose and then begin our focus on the "close read" strategy, which will involve the whole class deeply analyzing a couple texts over several days. Close reads require students to read a text 2-3 times in order to understand it in a deeper and more meaningful way.

Writing: As a class, we have been so busy writing letters! We followed along with some lessons from the Being a Writer curriculum where students worked in partnerships to write a letter to me, and to some of their classmates! In learning about the five parts of a friendly letter (date, greeting, body, closing, and signature), we have been really working on conventions (neatness, correct punctuation, capitalization, spacing). Next week, we will work on our Flat Stanley letters and get them ready to be mailed out. Please be sure they know who they are writing to and can spell the recipients name. Your children are beyond excited about this project and cannot wait to receive mail! As a reminder, I am having all the response letters/packages sent back to the school so we can see them as a class and then they will be sent home with your child. Our next writing unit will be Expository Writing, which is when a writer explains or shares information. Students will be introducing a topic, using facts and definitions to develop points, and providing a conclusion. This is an extensive unit that requires a lot of focus and detail and we will begin this after we finish our Flat Stanley project.

Math: In math we have been working on our unit of geometry and fractions. We spent about 2 weeks learning about different 2D shapes. We also studied the cube, a 3D shape, and how it is different than 2D based on its attributes. Students will be responsible for knowing different attributes for the 2D shapes such as how many sides, vertexes, angles, and faces (for the cube), as well as know how to draw the shapes. Please review these concepts at home with your child. This week we started learning about fractions. We focused on halves, thirds, and fourths. Students learned how to partition rectangles and circles into smaller and equal pieces. They have been learning the difference in size between the three types of fractions we are learning. They have also learned how to write fractions, identify fractions, and shade in fractions based on an amount given. As of now, I am planning for our test to be at the end of next week. In learning about these concepts, we had fun making our snowmen fractions, which are displayed outside our classroom! It was also fun to make our "all about me" fraction foldables, and operate in our fraction cookie bakery (be sure to "order" a fraction cookie from your child). Please continue to practice math facts each night for 5-10 minutes, specifically subtraction © I'd love to add some names to our popcorn incentive board! Our next unit that we will start will be all about money! This is always one of my favorite units, as it has many applications to real life, and who doesn't like talking and work with money!! Students will have many opportunities to work with dollar bills, pennies, nickels, dimes, and quarters. They will be solving word problems and representing a given total using multiple strategies and different coins.

Science: We have switched back to Science for the next several weeks. Our unit of study is on the different animal classes. Our first animal class we learned about this week is fish! Ask your child what characteristics a fish has. Ask them if a dolphin and whale are considered fish and see if they can explain why or why not! Next week, we will be learning about reptiles. The students are completing an animal book with all the facts we learn which will serve as a study guide for them down the road! Students have learned vocabulary such as: vertebrae, warmblooded, and cold-blooded.
