Here is what we have been learning...

Reading: The past two weeks we have been reviewing Questioning and Authors Purpose. Next week we will be reading many non-fiction books and determining the main idea and supporting details. In preparing students for the common core and PARCC assessment they will take next year, we will continue to focus on reading higher-level non-fiction stories that challenge students to use context clues to identify unknown words. They will continue to work with texts that have many text features as these formats challenge students to find the most important information out of a sea of information given to them. "This week we also began using the new program titled "Words Their Way". This is a phonics program that we will be using weekly that allows students to sort words based on similar patterns. The pattern of this week was "aw/au" that went in conjunction with Mrs. King's Monday lesson. The repeated experiences throughout the Monday lesson. The repeated experiences throughout the week with this new program will build on their spelling foundation.

Writing: We finished up our Flat Stanley project last week and all 50+ of them have been mailed out! I look forward to all of all 50+ of them have been mailed out! I look forward to all of them returning back from the interesting locations! This week we started our next writing unit, which is "Expository Writing". The purpose of this style of writing is to inform someone about a topic by providing facts. This week, students learned that when writing an expository writing piece, they must have 4 paragraphs (introduction, 2 main paragraphs (body), and a closing). Next week they will learn that when writing an introduction they must "hook" the reader. Three types of "hooks" we will learn about are: Asking a Question, Painting a Picture, and Onomatopoeia (using sound words to capture a readers attention). Within each of these four paragraphs, students will also learn next week that they must use transitional words and phrases to make the they must use transitional words and phrases to make the paragraphs and sentences flow nicely. This style of writing is very complex and often overwhelming to students in the beginning, as it is the longest form of writing they've been expected to do. For our first example, we are going through it as a class and filling out a graphic organizer together and then forming the sentences and a graphic organizer together and then forming the sentences and paragraphs about a topic they are very familiar with, PBIS. I am breaking up the example we are doing as a class by paragraphs and focusing on a different element each day. In the next two weeks, we will continue working on expository writing and their topic will be information about the presidents. Students will research a president in class, collect facts about their president, and then write an expository essay providing information they learned learned

Math: We took our unit 6 assessment on Tuesday for geometry and fractions. We then started unit 7 this week, which is all about <u>money</u>! This unit will continue for the remainder of February. We will continue to work with identifying contact shows the top the started on the started s identifying coins, showing multiple combinations of a given amount of money, counting mixed coins, and solving word problems that involve money. The most helpful thing you can do to help your child during this unit is to practice each night with real coins. You can give them a pile and have them count the coins, or tell them a value and have them show you how they'd make that amount. Many of them told me they already got to do that this week, and it left a great impression with them! Finding ways to excite them about learning is one of the best things we can do in our partnership of educating your child! With that being said, I have many links on my website that will allow them to practice with money. Students who earned their placement on the popcorn board for the month of January enjoyed their popcorn treat and freebie from the timed test this week! Congrats to Aria and Madison M for mastering 50+ subtraction facts. Please continue to practice math facts each night for 5-10 minutes, specifically subtraction ©

Science: So far, students have learned about the animal groups: Science: So far, students have learned about the animal groups: fish, reptiles, and birds. They have learned the characteristics for each animal classification and different examples in each animal group. Ask your child if they know the difference between warm blooded and cold blooded. In the next two weeks, we will be studying amphibians and mammals. Be sure to ask your child what their favorite animal group has been so far and one interesting fact they have learned!
